MEET THE MANAGERS

VALERIE LAM

I have worked at Barnet Mencap for over 12 years, but only recently became the Children's Service Manager in October 2024.

I am originally from near Glasgow in Scotland, as you may be able to tell from my accent. I studied Psychology at Strathclyde University in Glasgow and then worked for the **Employment** Service as an **Occupational** Psychologist, helping people with disabilities find work or training. I worked there for two years before moving to Tunbridge Wells in Kent. This was meant to be a temporary move as I was a Community Service Volunteer at a residential school for young with emotional people behavioural difficulties. However, after six months, I got a job as a residential social worker at the school and stayed there for another 6 years before leaving to train as a Primary School Teacher, completing my PGCE at Brighton University.

My first teaching job was in a small village school in East Sussex, where I worked for two years before I got married and moved to a very large primary school in Enfield, a bit of a culture shock!

I worked in the school for around 10 years, and during that time I

moved to Barnet and had my two children. Megan, who is now nineteen and Kian, who is seventeen. Kian was born with Down syndrome and needed a heart operation at 5 months old. His physiotherapy, speech and language therapy and visits from the amazing Preschool Teaching team (now called the Early Years Send Advisory Team) meant that it made sense to stop work for a few years and it was during this time that we started attendina Barnet Mencap's Open Door Sessions, never knowing that a few years later I would actually be running the Open Door Project myself.

Kian was five and Megan was seven when the Open Door position was advertised, and I was thrilled to start work with Barnet Mencap in May 2013.

Since then, I have worked across all the projects in the children's service, and I am honoured to now be the manager of such a wonderful, hardworking team.

When I am not working, I enjoy reading, particularly Murder Mysteries, visiting the theatre and exploring as much of the UK as I can.

CLACTON SEA TRIP




Equality Housing and COPs organised a joyful seaside outing to Clacton with our clients, and it was truly a day to remember!

BEING....MIA

When I first joined Equality Housing, I felt completely out of my depth. I didn't know how to manage day-to-day life. Things that seemed simple to other people — paying bills, keeping my place tidy, even cooking — felt impossible for me. I was nervous, unsure, and I didn't think I'd ever be able to stand on my own two feet.

But with support, I began to learn and grow. I wasn't judged for what I couldn't do — instead, people showed me how to take one step at a time. Slowly, I started to believe in myself. I learned new skills, began making decisions for myself, and found that I was more capable than I had ever imagined.

One of my proudest moments was cooking a sausage casserole for everyone in the house. It might sound small, but for me it was huge. I went from not being able to cook at all, to making a meal that we could all share together. Seeing people enjoy something I had made gave me a real sense of pride and belonging.

Now, I feel independent and confident. I can look after myself, make my own choices, and I no longer doubt that I can live the life I want. Equality Housing didn't just give me support — it gave me the chance to discover who I really am.


